<p>This course is divided into two key areas. The course studies the history of industrialized nations, with a particular focus upon revolutions; English Revolution and the beginnings of parliamentary democracy; the French Revolution and Napoleon; the American Revolution, and the Industrial Revolution. The second part of the course examines the early history of Canada. Different native groups across Canada are studied, as well as the impact of European contact upon those native groups. Furthermore, the early history of Canadian settlement and the fur trade is examined.</p>

<p>Social Studies 10 is a continuing study of Canadian history within the time frame of 1776 to 1914. This course is divided into four main sections identified as: The Geography of Canada, Our Developing Nation, The Development of the West, and Defining Canada. Within the context of the course various skills will be introduced or reinforced, such as: constructing graphs, researching print material, critical thinking, and interpreting maps.</p>

<p>In this course students will explore the impact of various events in the 20th Century. Students will increase their understanding that: Nationalist movements can unite people in common causes or lead to intense conflict between different groups. The rapid development and proliferation of technology in the 20th century led to profound social, economic, and political changes. The breakdown of long-standing empires created new economic and political systems.</p>

<p>In Comparative Cultures 12, students will explore the following Big Ideas: Understanding the diversity and complexity of cultural expressions in one culture enhances our understanding of other cultures. Interactions between belief systems, social organization, and languages influence artistic expressions of culture. Geographic and environmental factors influenced the development of agriculture, trade, and increasingly complex cultures. Value systems and belief systems shape the structures of power and authority within a culture.</p>

<p>Distance Learning Course—In Human Geography 12, students will explore the following Big Ideas: Analyzing data from a variety of sources allows us to better understand our globally connected world. A geographic region can encompass a variety of physical features and/or human interactions.</p>

Social Justice 12 is a course that explores the nature of a just and equitable society by focusing on social justice issues. It offers students opportunities to study the legal, political, ethical, and economic perspectives that inform Canadian concepts of justice and equality. Students will deliberate on social justice matters--local to global--for the purpose of developing and demonstrating behaviours that promote social justice, including recognizing injustice, fair-mindedness, embracing diversity, empathy, and taking action, connections between and among such issues as: class, race, poverty, LGBTQ rights, status of women, environmental and ecological justice, peace and globalization, disabilities, other marginalized and vulnerable groups.
