Every year, September 30th marks
Truth and Reconciliation day. This day
honours those who were affected by
residential schools, including those
who never returned home, survivors,
their families and their communities.



The first part of recognizing and understanding what happened in the past is listening to, and learning the truth.

To accomplish this, we need to listen to the stories of Indigenous People's experiences with residential schools and any other unfair policies.



A BRIEF HISTORY OF RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS


Residential schools were created by Christian churches and the Canadian government as an attempt to assimilate Indigenous youth into their vision of Canadian society. The children attending these schools suffered various forms of abuse and the inadequate environment led to a high death toll.

The first residential school opened in BC in 1867, and the last one closed in Saskatchewan, 1996.



What does it mean?

Accroding to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission:

"Reconciliation is about establishing and maintaining a mutually respectful relationship between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples in this country. In order for that to happen, there has to be awareness of the past, an acknowledgement of the harm that has been inflicted, atonement for the causes, and action to change behaviour."


