Message from the Principal

As we enter the final stretch of the school year, May has brought with it both celebration and reflection.

This month, our school participated in the Moose Hide Campaign, a national movement to stand up against violence toward women and children. Students engaged in meaningful discussions about respect, safety, and responsibility, and many chose to wear their moose hide pins with pride. A highlight of the day was a reflective walk led by Kookum Brenda for our intermediate students, offering them a powerful opportunity to connect more deeply with the message of the campaign. It was heartening to see our learners take these conversations seriously and reflect on their role in creating a safe and inclusive community.

We've recently noticed a number of students arriving at school on bikes and scooters without wearing protective headgear. While we're thrilled to see so many students choosing active transportation, safety must come first. Helmets are required by law and are essential for protecting our children from serious injury. In addition, once students arrive on school grounds, they are expected to dismount and walk their bikes or scooters to the designated parking areas. We appreciate your support in reinforcing these expectations at home to help keep everyone safe.

Recent conflict on the soccer field gave us an opportunity to lean into restorative practices.

Students came together in a circle discussion to voice their perspectives and work collaboratively to establish new structures that promote fair play, safety, and inclusion. It was a powerful reminder of the importance of student voice and the value of solving problems as a community.

Of course, we must also celebrate the incredible success of our Maker Faire! The creativity, innovation, and joy on display were truly inspiring. From waterpainted bookmarks to handsewn

bags, students showcased their entrepreneural prowess. Thank you to our parents and students for supporting our students.

Finally, I want to share that I will be going on medical leave starting May 28. During this time, Ms. Tandy Gunn will be joining our school as acting principal. Tandy brings a wealth of experience and is deeply committed to student well-being and strong instructional leadership. I know the school community will be in excellent hands. Ms. Heather MacLeod will continue in her role as vice principal, ensuring strong continuity and support for students, staff, and families.

My Ride K-12 Transportation Website/App

The district is introducing a new Transportation App/Website service, **My Ride K-12** that will be the primary method of communicating bus routing information to families moving forward. This service is available via a web browser and website or via a downloadable app which includes notification features. School Bus Registration for the 2025/26 school year is now open! Go to the Qualicum School District Transportation website to access the online application form. Get your application in **before the end of this school year** for the best opportunity to secure a spot for you child and to avoid extra fees.

*Parents and caregivers who believe these fees will cause financial hardship in their household are encouraged to speak to their school principal about fee relief. Options may include partial or even full fee waivers, depending on need, which will then be communicated by the principal to the Transportation Department.

REGISTRATION PROCESSING TIMELINES

April – June 30 only Eligible bus pass applications will be processed, on a first come/first served basis.

- If a bus reaches capacity, an <u>Eligible Rider wait lis</u>t will be created. You will be notified if you are put on a wait list.
- Courtesy rider applications received during this time will not be processed until after July 1.
- Exact bus route information will be distributed to families before the first day of school through My Ride K-12 website and App.

July 1- onwards Courtesy, as well as late Eligible bus pass applications will be processed on a first come/first served basis as space is available on the bus route(s) requested.

- Courtesy riders that are offered a space on the bus will be notified and asked to pay the
 necessary fees. When payment is received the application will be finalized. If payment is
 not made within 5 business days of being offered the space, the application will be redated and put back into the queue.
- If a bus reaches capacity, a wait list will be created. You will be notified if you are put on a wait list.
- Exact bus route information will be distributed to families before the first day of school through My Ride K-12 website and App.



Vaccine Status Reporting for Students

Island Health is working to ensure all school-aged children in B.C. have complete immunization records through the **Vaccination Status Reporting Regulation (VSRR)**. Families of students with missing or incomplete records will receive a letter in the mail with instructions on how to update records online or through a local health unit. Schools do not collect immunization records.
