## *Message from the Principal*

**'Uy skweyul. Good day.**

We have settled back into our school routines following the winter break, and the second term of learning is now well underway. We are now halfway through the school year, and it has been wonderful to see the growth our students are making academically, socially, and emotionally. We are currently in the season of **THULXWUMUCUN** — the Moon of Shining Ice, and have been enjoying the crisp, bright and sometimes [foggy](#) winter days. As students spend time outdoors each day, please ensure your child comes to school dressed appropriately for the weather, including warm clothing, suitable footwear, and extra clothes for muddy slips or splashes.

These past couple of weeks, we are conducting our middle-of-year DIBELS literach screener with students. This screener along with ongoing assessments allow us to celebrate the progress our learners are making in literacy and provide teachers with valuable information to plan instruction that meets the needs of each child. It is exciting to see students' confidence and skills continue to grow as they tackle new challenges in reading and writing.

In addition to literacy, students are engaging in rich learning about Inuit ways of life. They are making arctic sunglasses, exploring the science and beauty of the aurora borealis—which we have been fortunate to see at our latitude—and learning about polar bears and Arctic habitats. These experiences help connect students to Indigenous knowledge, spark curiosity, and deepen understanding of the world around them.

Thank you for your ongoing support as we continue to nurture curiosity, growth, and resilience in all our learners during this halfway point of the school year.

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## *Let Kids Learn Through Risk*

### **Stepping back helps kids grow**

Children develop confidence and resilience when they are allowed to face challenges and manage risk on their own. At school, this means students tackle tricky problems, resolve conflicts with peers, and try new skills without constant adult intervention. By experiencing small failures in a safe space, they learn persistence, problem-solving, and self-confidence.

On the playground, letting kids navigate social dynamics or test their physical limits—climbing higher, experimenting with new games, or negotiating rules—teaches responsibility, collaboration, and resilience. These moments help children grow socially, emotionally, and physically in ways that adult-led guidance cannot replicate.

### **Tips for Supporting Risk at Home**

- Let children try tasks independently before stepping in.
- Encourage choices within safe boundaries.
- Allow natural consequences and learning from mistakes.
- Praise effort, creativity, and persistence, not just outcomes.
- Let children experience disappointment or hurt feelings safely, and help them reflect on how to manage emotions constructively.
- Model resilience by showing how you tackle challenges and recover.
- Discuss potential risks and strategies before new activities.

Small steps like these help children gain independence, confidence, and lifelong problem-solving skills—all by letting them take the lead in their own learning.

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### Kindergarten 2026 Registration Open January 19, 2026

Online Kindergarten registration (through MyEdBC) for the 2026-2027 school year opens on January 19, 2026. To qualify for Kindergarten enrolment in September 2026, a child must become five years of age on or before December 31, 2026. Proof of Age for a student includes a birth certificate or passport. Check out the School District website registration page to see what else you need to know.
