

LOCAL SCHOLARSHIP COVER LETTER GUIDELINES
2019-2020

Write a letter (ideally one page, but can go over) indicating why you are a qualified candidate for a **local** scholarship and / or bursary. Think about your personal experiences. This is not just a written version of your resume. **Be sure to explain how activities have affected or shaped the person you are today, but do not go into detailed lists (save that for the scholarship resume).**

Include the following information (if applicable), but the order may vary:

1. Academic and / or vocational achievements
 - School Information (Since this information is also included in your resume, be sure to explain or emphasize **how it has impacted you**).
 - Principal's List
 - Academic Achievements
 - Science Research Methods
 - University Courses

2. Extra-curricular activities (athletics, student government, dry grad, etc.)
Related to school (not courses!):
 - Athletics
 - Clubs
 - Grad Council
 - Dry Grad activities
 - Career Preparation / Work Experience Program (e.g., Head Start
 - Music
 - Theatre
 - Leadership Program(s)

3. Community activities / services.
(Again, do not just give me a list—tell me how these have impacted you and your community):
 - Volunteer activities
 - 4-H Club (etc.)
 - ENITY
 - Big Brothers/Big Sisters

4. Post-secondary educational plan / intended area(s) of study and future career goals
 - What has inspired you to go to university?
 - Why are you applying for the scholarship?
 - What is your passion or spark?
 - What change do you wish to make with your education?
 - Anything else you think we should know If not a lot of activity, why?
 - Financial need? Explain the circumstances.
 - What do you plan to study? What are your plans for a career?

Hints:

1. Use proper letter format • Use Letter Wizard if necessary
2. Open with: • Dear Mr. Meredith,
3. Show gratitude with a thank you statement
4. Sign your letter • 4 spaces between "Sincerely" and name

Top Twelve Tips for Scholarship Letter Writing:

1. Make sure you answer the questions or speak to the scholarship criteria.
2. Remember, your audience will not understand references to what you think is common knowledge (ex - you need to explain what Leadership Club is, what STRIVE is, what Leaders in Training is, or what Interact Club is)
3. Spell out acronyms in full the first time they are introduced (ex. I work for the Regional District of Nanaimo (RDN), as a youth leader).
4. Capitalize all formal nouns - names, clubs, employers, schools, Grade 12.
5. Avoid contractions, unless absolutely necessary (it's, they're, don't, couldn't).
6. Write-out all numbers under one-hundred except grade levels (ex – When I was fifteen years old, I began working at..... OR.... In Grade 12, I volunteered at....)
7. Be confident, but not arrogant/elitist (ex - do not claim to be the best).
8. Avoid vague over-generalizations (ex - I had a huge impact on their lives OR I volunteer lots in my community to help people in need).
9. Provide details about WHAT specifically you did, and WHAT skills you developed. The impact is just as important as the action - (ex – Serving as the Leadership Club Treasurer allowed me the opportunity to develop my organizational skills, as I was responsible for counting, recording, and depositing fundraising proceeds. I also learned how to use Excel when creating a budget spreadsheet.). Surface-level lists of volunteer work are not effective, unless you are faced with a strict word limit.
10. Avoid repetition of ideas and words; everything you say should serve a purpose.
11. Your first and last sentences should be your best sentences. Format letters like an essay - start with a hook, end with a clincher.
12. Avoid informal language or bland adverbs/adjective (Trump talk); use powerful language and consult a thesaurus (or a teacher) if you are struggling to find the right words (ex – Volunteering at the Society of Organized Services (SOS) really benefitted my community and made me a better person).
