Principal's Message

We are now in mid-October, and the school has a positive buzz as classes are busy with a variety of learning and social activities. Teachers are busy getting to know the strengths and stretches of all their students. Students at all grade levels are engaged in a variety of assessments that help staff determine benchmarks for literacy and numeracy development. Friendships are developing and social skills, such as communication and collaboration, are being practiced.

Many of our grade 6 and 7 students have signed up for senior leadership, under the direction of our teacher librarian, Ms. Richards. The students have interviewed for various roles within the school and are now actively supporting many aspects of our school community. Our leadership team is volunteering their time as library pages - delivering the technology carts, re-shelving library books and helping with other essential tasks. Other members of the team are kindergarten helpers, supporting our youngest students with end of day routines. And still other senior leaders are helping with setting up for assemblies and special activities, to ensure these events go off smoothly. Our older students are proving to be wonderful role models for our younger children. It is lovely to see them looking out for younger students on the playground and reinforcing our code of conduct by demonstrating safety, respect and responsibility. Their efforts help to foster a positive learning environment at EES.

Emergency Preparedness & Drills

Unforeseen emergencies can strike without warning, often leaving us with minimal time to react to a significant disruption in both our personal lives and our communities. Schools, being prominent gathering places, bear a unique responsibility when it comes to emergency preparedness. Ensuring the safety and well-being of our students and staff, as well as instilling confidence in parents as you entrust your child(ren) to our care. We have started practicing several scenarios with our students including fire, earthquake and lockdown drills so far.

Below are the dates and times of our scheduled drills for this school year. Please reach out to your child(ren)'s teacher if you have any questions or concerns.

Shelter in Place is used when personal safety is considered to be in danger if anyone leaves the school. It is usually an environmental hazard or wildlife in the vicinity of the school.

- Exterior windows and doors locked.
- Free movement within the building.
- Remain inside until advised that conditions are safe

Lockout (also known as Hold and Secure) is used when it is necessary to secure a school because there is an emergency situation occurring outside the school. The exterior doors are locked and monitored to allow students and staff to enter but otherwise remain locked. Once inside, no one leaves the building.

- Exterior windows and doors locked and monitored.
- Students and staff may enter from outside.
- Classes function as normal.
- Remain inside until advised that conditions are safe

Lockdown is used to prevent intruders from entering occupied areas of a building or when it is necessary to isolate students and staff from danger outside or within the building. Situations include active shooters or dangerous intruders. Staff and students are restricted in their movement.

- Exterior windows and doors locked.
- Everyone inside
- All windows and doors locked.
- Lights off and everybody out of sight and silent.
- Ignore bells.
- Remain inside until advised by authorities that conditions are safe

Inclement Weather and Clothing

Although we have had sunny days, we know that soon the rainy weather will be upon us! It is extremely important for students to have appropriate clothing and footwear for outdoor use, along with a pair of inside shoes to change into when inside the building. These shoes are also used for gym use. We expect students to wear warm coats (hoods are a good idea) and we recommend boots, hats, gloves, and umbrellas. In general, students go outside to play during recess and lunch breaks, even if it is raining or snowing. Each day, we assess the combination of weather, wind, and temperature to determine whether or not it is suitable for the students to play outside. We recommend that students have a spare change of clothing kept at school in case of various emergencies. We have a very limited supply of clothing available.

Drop-off and Pick-up - Reminder

Please note that school begins at 8:10am. If you are dropping off your child prior to 8:10am, please use the Lower Parking Lot. If you are dropping off after 8:10am, you may pull up to the front of the school. Students who arrive after 8:15am must report to the office before going to their classroom. We are noticing a number of cars coming in and out of the top lot, and it is becoming unsafe for pedestrians.

Please make sure your child's teacher is aware of your child's after school schedule. We need to know if your child is getting picked up (and by who) or taking the bus.





Student Information Forms

Over the past weeks we sent out some very important forms to fill out. These are annually updated and are required in order to keep our records current. The package includes a sheet called "Student Verification Form" (white form) and a sheet called "Student Health and Emergency Information" (green form). Even if there are no changes to your child's information, we still need you to **sign** those forms and return to the school as soon as possible.

Wheelie Shoes



We would like to remind families that wheelie shoes are not permitted at school. We ask students to leave these at home, for their safety and the safety of others.






