Principal's Message

I hope you had a chance to enjoy the spring break with your children. We have many exciting things to look forward to this spring. Please make sure to check the dates to remember in this newsletter and update your calendars at home.

With the longer days and the spring weather trying to make an appearance, we hope that the children are spending time outdoors. For those students who do spend time on the computer, the article below provides suggestions on how to make online safety a priority in your home.

Technology has changed how students learn and how they socialize. Millions of kids in all age groups are online every day – at home, at school, at friends' homes, at the library – and many are creating online content. We know that some of our students are active on social media platforms such as Instagram, Snapchat, Musicaly, Facebook, and chat groups formed through gaming devices. Did you know that most of those sites have a minimum age requirement of 13. To keep your child safe online:

Discuss rules and expectations. Use software that helps to protect kids, but supervise carefully, too. Only allow your child to communicate with people you both know when he's online.

Set limits on screen time, such as 10 hours or fewer **per week**. Remember that screen time includes TV, computer and video game use.

Do not allow your child to reveal personal information online, such as his name, phone number, school, passwords or location.

Keep Internet access out of your child's room. Only let your child go online if you can see what he's doing.

Learn about websites your child wants to visit. Are they safe? Do you approve of their content? **Encourage your child** to be honest with you if something inappropriate occurs online. React calmly if this happens. Report your concerns to the authorities.

Stay informed about online safety. Visit sites such as www.fosi.org (Family Online Safety Institute) and Netsmartz.org for more tips.

Families on the Move?

Please let the school office know if your family will be moving next year. As planning is underway for next year, it is very helpful if we are aware of any students who will not be attending our school in September.

<u>Planning for September</u>

Soon we will begin developing a draft class organization for next school year. This includes projecting student enrolment and creating classes that make the most efficient use of our staff, while at the same time, observing provincial class size limits and building classes that can work together as a team. Attached below is a letter from the Assistant Superintendent regarding class formation for September 2019. If you would like to provide input to your child's placement, please do this by **Thursday**, **April 18th**. Please note that parent input is one of a number of factors that guide us in the formation of classes. We must pay attention to the other important considerations outlined in the letter below, which contribute to an optimum learning environment for all children. While a smaller school such as ours has many benefits, we are also faced with a very limited number of classes at each grade level – which limits placement options.

Dear Parent(s)/Guardian(s):

RE: CLASS BUILDING FOR 2019-20

During the next month, staff at our schools will begin the complex process of forming learning groups for the upcoming school year. This work includes projecting student enrollment and creating classes that make the most effective use of our staff and most importantly, building balanced student groupings that can work together cohesively as learning communities. This is a challenging task as there are many factors that must be taken into consideration including:

- Social and emotional dynamics
- · Academic strengths and needs
- Unique learning needs
- Class size goals

Staff take this work very seriously and collaborate extensively in order to make the best decisions about student placement. We strive to shape classes which will support the learning needs of **all** students.

There are many unknowns as we begin this task. For example:

- We are not sure who all of the teachers will be at our schools next year as the annual staffing process is not completed until late June
- Some staff members may request, or be asked, to change their assignment for next year
- We are never completely clear about our enrollment until early September and so learner groupings must remain somewhat fluid

As a result, the learner groupings that we create in spring are tentative and are not finalized until early in the new school year. For this reason, class groupings will be kept confidential until they are finalized in September.

If you would like to provide staff at your child's school with input into their placement for next year, we encourage you to:

- 1. Talk to your child's current classroom teacher about your interests, and then;
- Send a note to the school principal outlining what you see as your child's learning needs, preferred learning style or any other information you think might be relevant as staff work through the task of shaping learning environments for the upcoming year.

We ask that you <u>do not request a specific teacher</u>. Your input will be considered along with the other complex variables that go into constructing a class; however, not all recommendations can be honoured.

The deadline for submitting information regarding your child's class placement is Thursday, April 18, 2019.

Criminal Record Check completed prior to taking part in volunteer activities (classroom activities, school activities, field trips, etc.). They are good for 5 years. With so many field trips and special activities coming up, we wanted to remind you of this expectation. We do have a letter available at the EES office for you to get so that you don't have to pay the usual fee for getting this done. The RCMP have advised us that there is at least a two-week timeline to complete the process, but it could take longer during peak times. Please note that due to privacy regulations, organizations cannot share this type of information, so you need a separate Criminal Record Check completed for each organization you volunteer with. If you are not sure you have completed a criminal record check for EES please ask the office.


NEWS FROM YOUR LIBRARY

VIU STUDENTS BRIGHTEN CHILDREN'S SMILES

SUMMARY: VIU's Dental Hygiene and Child and Youth Care students team up to provide free teeth cleanings for low income families.

NANAIMO, BC: "If the children walk away with a smile on their face, we know we've done a good job," says Connor Edwards, a fourth-year student in Vancouver Island University's (VIU's) Child and Youth Care (CYC) program.

The CYC and <u>Dental Hygiene</u> programs have teamed up to organize the Healthy Kids Dental Clinic – a free or by-donation dental check-up service for low-income families.

"We started three years ago after having community discussions on how we can better serve families in the area," says Teri Derksen, VIU CYC Professor.

Healthy Kids is a community initiative created by the CYC's <u>Centre for Community Outreach and Care</u>, which focuses on social justice-inspired activities to support children and families in the Harewood area. Third-year students advertise the program by reaching out to schools and through social media and coordinate appointments, while the dental hygiene students perform the dental work for the children.

"Routine dental care isn't financially accessible to everyone – especially for families without extended health-care plans – so having this service at the university is invaluable to us," says a mother of three children accessing the clinic, who asked to remain anonymous. "The students take the time to get the kids comfortable and make it really fun for them."

The clinic operates on a scheduled Saturday every year and sees about 30 children throughout the day. Dr. Alex Chen volunteers as the in-house dentist and 18 dental hygiene students in both first and second year provide teeth cleanings, X-rays and oral hygiene training to patients.

"This is a great opportunity for us to practice our dental skills while working with younger patients," says Jaime Wagner, second-year Dental Hygiene student. "Our main focus is to make this a fun, memorable experience for the children so they continue to take care of their oral health throughout their life."

Immunization (Measles) Catch up for Students in Kindergarten to Grade 4

All kindergarten to grade 4 students who are behind on their immunizations will be receiving a call from the public health unit in the upcoming weeks. These students will be offered immunizations at a school-based immunization clinic over the next couple of months with the consent of a parent, guardian or representative. Parent(s), guardians or representatives will be required to accompany students to the public health school based immunization clinic.

Students who are up to date on their immunizations will receive a record of immunization by the end of this school year. These will be distributed from public health and delivered to the students at school. Please keep this record to provide to your child's school this fall.

First Nations children who receive health services in their communities may be able to access immunization records and services at their Community Health Centers.




