Principal's Message

Although the snow has provided for some fun in the past week, we are appreciating the sunshine and seeing some early hints of spring around the corner! Many important learning activities have been taking place. Routines are well established and work can become challenging as students move along the learning continuum and expectations are increased. With this, comes the need for greater independence. We continue our focus on supporting students to become more independent, especially when they face increased challenges and have a tendency to want to "give up". The article below shares some strategies on how to help your child develop the important skill of perseverance, also known as "grit". Researchers say "grit" is key to your child's school success:

What do spelling champions and West Point cadets have in common? It's a quality known as *grit* – the ability to stick with something even when it's hard.

Current research shows that grit is important. People who persist when a task gets challenging are most likely to be successful. To promote grit:

- **Teach your child to focus** on how good it feels to finish a tough task. "You did your homework. Now you can relax and enjoy yourself."
- **Emphasize starting.** People with grit don't put off unpleasant tasks. So help your child develop the habit of getting started. "You work on homework and I'll clean these drawers. Let's see what we can finish in 15 minutes."
- Stress effort over ability. Tell your child that success requires dedication and effort as much or more than intelligence. Notice every bit of hard work your child does and every small step of progress he makes.

Update on Mask Expectations

The last newsletter included updates in regards to health guidelines. Upon clarification, the stronger mask requirements DO NOT apply to our Grades 5, 6, and 7 students in Elementary Schools. We continue to require all students to wear masks on school buses. Grade 5, 6, and 7 students in our Elementary Schools will continue to follow expectations outlined at the beginning of this school year:

- Wear a mask in high traffic and/or common areas;
- Wear a mask when outside their learning group;
- Wear a mask when you are not able to maintain a 2 meter distance in common areas inside the school.
- Wear a mask if you start to experience symptoms of illness and are waiting to be picked up.

Please ensure you continue to screen your child daily for symptoms of illness and keep your child at home if they are not well. To support daily screening, **a new K-12 health-checker app** has been developed for students and their families and can be found at: <u>https://www.k12dailycheck.gov.bc.ca</u>. The app will allow people to answer simple questions every day. It will inform them if they can attend school or if they need to self-isolate and contact 811 to be screened for COVID-19.

Additionally, **any visitor** to a school or worksite is required to wear a non-medical mask. Please call the office (250-248-8446) to make arrangements to collect or drop-off items. We reserve entry to our school for exceptional circumstances only. If you must enter the building, go only to the main office, maintain physical distancing, and keep your visit very short. We really appreciate your cooperation with this!

Please know we are doing everything possible to keep our students and staff safe during this pandemic. As we have experienced a higher number of COVID-19 cases on the central Vancouver Island and a few exposures in some SD69 schools, we pause to reflect on how close to home this virus really is. It is a good reminder to ask yourself, **"What can I do to reduce the risk of exposure for myself and my family"**. We know it is important to continue following the provincial health orders, follow the guidelines and protocols, and minimize our social contacts. As the months go by, we know how hard this is on everyone. Thank you for your continued support. We will get through this together! As Dr. Bonnie Henry continues to advise...be kind, be calm, and be safe.

Morning Drop-off

For those students who are dropped off in the mornings, please remember that we encourage a staggered drop-off to help reduce crowds. Please drop-off your child as close to 8:12am as possible. School starts at 8:12am, but we wait to send attendance to the office until 8:30am. If your child arrives between 8:12am and 8:30am, they can go directly to their classroom. If your child arrives after 8:30am, they need to check in at the office.

We have noticed many cars pulling up to the school while buses are arriving. If you are dropping your child off BEFORE 8:12am, please use the lower parking lot. Students arriving AFTER 8:12am may drive up to the front of the school.

School District 69 (Qualicum) is proud to offer a range of Programs of Choice that provide unique and innovative learning opportunities for our diverse student population.

Programs of Choice are staffed consistent with the district's overarching methodology and philosophy regarding financial prudence. For these reasons, Programs of Choice classrooms are often (like regular classrooms) organized into combined grade configurations. All program options either align with or support the B.C. curriculum and help provide a pathway towards Grade 12 graduation.

The Board of Education is committed to Programs of Choice placement sustainability to the best extent possible, but must balance this commitment with emergent building capacity pressures, and the importance of students being able to attend their neighbourhood school. All Programs of Choice are reviewed annually as part of the budget process. Programs of Choice typically generate much interest and are continued each year, however they can be subject to cancellation due to enrollment and budgetary considerations. Please note that space in these programs is limited.

Student Learning Survey

The Student Learning Survey is for students in Grades 4, 7, 10, and 12, their parents, and staff.

The survey covers a wide range of topics and provides feedback on the implementation of the curriculum changes, learning environment, student wellness and satisfaction, student belonging and engagement, and career preparation. Questions were developed with input from partner groups, teachers and experts in educational measurement and special education. This survey will be administered to our Grade 4 and 7 students during April. Parents of Grade 4 and 7 students are encouraged to complete this survey by clicking on the link below.

Parents may access the survey following the directions and link for **Direct Access** below. Surveys are to be completed by parents with children in Grades 4, 7, 10, and 12. A parent may complete a survey for each child in the targeted grades. The parent survey is available in English, French and 16 other languages. Thank you in advance for your participation. The survey is open until midnight on April 30, 2021.

To complete the survey:

- 1. Go to any computer that has an up-to-date internet browser access.
- 2. Go to www.bced.gov.bc.ca/sat_survey/access.htm
- 3. Under the "Parent" section Direct Access no logon number required select:
 - District: the name of your child's district (69 Qualicum)
 - School: the name of your child's school (Errington Elementary)
 - Language: the language of your choice
- 4. Complete the survey by clicking on the appropriate circle to answer each question. Move to the next set of questions by clicking on the right arrow in the bottom right corner of the screen. Click on the left arrow to navigate backwards.
- 5. When you are finished the survey, you will get a message "Thank you for sharing your views".

Other Important Reminders

- We are required to follow the BC Healthy Food and Beverage Guidelines when serving food in schools. If you are wanting to send treats to school to help celebrate a special occasion, please contact your child's teacher in advance to make arrangements. Food must be prepared and packaged in a Food Safe Certified facility.
- Please make sure your child has appropriate clothing and footwear for outdoor use, along with a pair of inside shoes and an extra change of clothes. We also recommend having a warm coat, hat, umbrella, and gloves. We have a good supply of clothing and hand-knit items on hand. Please let us know if your child is in need of any winter clothing.
- If you haven't paid your child's school fees, please contact the school office or classroom teacher.
- When reporting your child's absence, please call the office at 250-248-8446 (after hours
 you can leave a message on our answering service just listen for the option to report
 a student absence in the directory). It is important to let the office know if your child will
 be late or not attending school for the day(s) so your child is accounted for. It only takes
 a minute. If your child is not at school or late you can expect to receive a call to your
 main number. Thank you in advance for reporting early!
- Due to current guidelines, school buses are **not** to be used for any other purpose (ie. play dates). The Transportation Department have asked that parents **do not send notes** with their child requesting to ride another bus. Students are only permitted to ride the bus they are registered with. Please refer to the School District website for all school bus information.

Pink Shirt Day

We are encouraging students to wear a pink shirt on Wednesday, February 24th to celebrate national pink shirt day. We hope students may have one from previous years and we do encourage "hand-me-downs" as children grow.

The pink shirt campaign started in eastern Canada by a group of youth who were protesting the treatment of a fellow student who chose to wear pink. Students were making inappropriate remarks about boys wearing pink, so



several male students decided to wear pink themselves to stand up to the name-calling and to support their peers who chose to wear pink. They wanted to make a statement about one of our fundamental freedoms of expression. The tradition has continued for several years now.
