VOICES OF NATURE CONCERT – IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Concert and Open House is scheduled for next Thursday, October 13th from 4:45pm-7:00pm!

We are getting excited about the special events planned for the next week at EES!

Beginning on Tuesday, October 11th, two professional musicians, Holly Arntzen and Kevin Wright, will begin to practice with EES students. For the past month our students have learned 6 songs on the 'Voices of Nature' theme and have been organized into primary and intermediate groups, as well as whole school songs. On Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday next week, Holly and Kevin will work with the students to choreograph a concert on Thursday evening, just before the Open House/Meet the Teacher Night. Selected students will also work with Holly to use their own writing to introduce songs in the concert. Students interested in singing a "solo" will have an opportunity to audition on Tuesday, October 11th.

On Thursday afternoon (October 13th), students will be dismissed as usual at 1:58pm. Students need to return to their classrooms at **4:30pm** to prepare for the 4:45pm concert. We recognize parking will be a challenge. Here are some parking options:

- Park in the lower lot, in marked stalls and along the side of the road.
- Park on either side of Fairdowne Rd.
- Park along Middlegate Rd. or at the end of Koepernick Rd. and walk through the RDN trail
- Park along Grafton Avenue. A shuttle bus will be available between 4:15pm-4:45pm to pick people up along the road and drop off at the front of the school. Just park and wave down the SD69 bus as it moves between the intersection of Grafton/Leffler and the school. It will be available again between 6:30pm-7:00pm to return to your vehicle.

The concert will be about 45 minutes. Gym doors will open at 4:15pm. After the concert, we will ask the audience to exit using the gym doors that lead to the basketball court at the back of the school. Students will return to their classrooms where the open house/meet the teacher part of the evening will begin. Please use the exterior classroom doors to enter and exit in order to limit the foot traffic in the hallways. Other activities planned for the evening include:

A BBQ/Concession, located by the bike racks at the front of the building.

A "Free Store" will be located outside Room 9 near the Rainbow Playground at the back of the school. Shoes, clothing, and toiletry items will be available at no cost...bring an empty bag and help yourself!

Students who are in both our Band programs are encouraged to bring parents back to the gym at 5:45pm for an activity with Ms. Siedlecki.

Here are some important points to note:

- **Participation:** If you know your child will NOT be participating in the Thursday evening concert, please let your teacher or the office know. We need this information for stage planning purposes.
- **Student Dress:** For the evening concert, students should dress in dark pants or skirt and a solid bright colour top (no logos on the front please); t-shirts are OK. You don't need to buy something new! Our goal is to create a rainbow of colour on stage. If you don't have an unmarked bright coloured shirt, we recommend turning the shirt inside out to reveal the solid colour.
- **Seating:** We plan to hold the concert in the EES Gym. Seating will be on a "first come, first serve" basis. If you or a guest have mobility issues, please contact the office and we will reserve a seat for you. There is a chance we could have the concert outside if the weather continues to stay warm. If this happens, the students will assemble on the hill to the field and chairs will be set up on the field, facing the school.
- **Concession:** On the evening of the concert, our PAC will be hosting a concession of mainly Hot Dogs, Corn on the Cob, and other goodies by donation.
- **Photos/Videos:** We have a number of students who have media restrictions in place and parents have indicated they do not want their child's photo to appear publicly. In order to respect the privacy of our students, we ask that you do NOT download, copy, or distribute any pictures or other personal information through social media that contain images of students and/or student work other than your child's.
- **Health Note:** As usual, please stay home if you or your child are sick. This is our first "big event" since December 2019 and we want everyone to stay healthy!

This will be the first time we have been able to gather our community together for a school-wide event since the winter concert in December, 2019! We believe that this will be a terrific experience for our students and would like to thank the EES Parents' Advisory Council for their financial support to make this special event possible. We would also like to thank the EES staff for teaching the song lyrics to our students and for showing flexibility and commitment to help make this all happen.

Halloween

As you know, Halloween is on Monday, October 31st. We are planning some safe, fun activities for students to do at school on that day. Thank you to our Grade 6/7 leadership club students for planning such



a great day for our school community. We have decided to once again allow students to wear costumes if they wish! Students may wear a costume on Monday, October 31st. If your child does not want to wear a costume, we encourage students to wear black and/or orange. We do have some costume guidelines that must be followed to ensure everyone has a safe and fun day:

- Masks are NOT to be worn outside on the playground or in the hallways and washrooms. Teachers will give direction on the expectations in classrooms.
- No heavy make-up.
- Leave all costume "weapons" at home (swords, knives, guns, etc.).
- Bring a change of clothes (some students have PE class and may be asked to change if the costume interferes with mobility).
- Due to ongoing concerns about "Creepy Clowning", we ask that students avoid costumes of this nature.
- We have learned of a concerning Netflix series called "Squid Games" that many students have been watching and trying to copy. Please make sure your child avoids costumes portraying extreme violence.

Student Information Forms

If you haven't done so already, please remember to fill out and return the student information forms that were sent home in a package a few weeks ago. These are annually updated and are required in order to keep our records current. The package includes a sheet called "Student Verification Form" (white form) and a sheet called "Student Health and Emergency Information" (green form). Even if there are no changes to your child's information, we still need you to **sign** those forms and return to the school as soon as possible.

Just Be You Club

Once again, we will be starting up a "Just Be You" club for interested students in Grades 4 to 7. The purpose of this club is to create a safe space for students to build awareness and acceptance, create friendships, and develop leadership skills within our school community. Our school counsellor (Ms. Fernandez) will be facilitating this group. They will be exploring various topics of interest to participants. NEW WAY TO PAY

Our district has made it possible to pay for any school fees online. If your student's classroom teacher has requested to use agendas, a sheet with detailed instructions on how to sign up for School Cash Online has come home. If your student's teacher is not using agendas this year a detail sheet will come home shortly. On our Errington Website there is a direct link to www.schoolcashonline.com, it is quite easy to sign up. Once signed up you will receive email notifications if there is a fee associated with your student. You are still able to pay for any school fees with cash or cheque, but we are offering the option to pay online.

<u>Important Reminders</u>

- We are required to follow the BC Healthy Food and Beverage Guidelines when serving food in schools. If you are wanting to send treats to school to help celebrate a special occasion, please contact your child's teacher in advance to make arrangements. Food must be prepared and packaged in a Food Safe Certified facility.
- Please make sure your child has appropriate clothing and footwear for outdoor use, along with a pair of inside shoes and an extra change of clothes. We also recommend having a warm coat, hat, umbrella, and gloves. We have a good supply of clothing and hand-knit items on hand. Please let us know if your child needs any warm clothing.
- When reporting your child's absence, please call the office at 250-248-8446 (after hours you can leave a message on our answering service just listen for the option to report a student absence in the directory). It is important to let the office know if your child will be late or not attending school for the day(s) so your child is accounted for. It only takes a minute. If your child is not at school or late you can expect to receive a call to your main number. Thank you in advance for reporting early!
- School begins at 8:10am. If you are dropping off your child prior to 8:10am, please use
 the Lower Parking Lot. If you are dropping off after 8:10am, you may pull up to the front
 of the school. Students who arrive after 8:15am must report to the office before going
 to their classroom.
- Please make sure your child's teacher is aware of your child's after school schedule. We need to know if your child is getting picked up (and by who) or taking the bus.

Use of Technology

We value the use of technology as an integral part of teaching and learning. Our handheld devices have become part of our daily routines and give us access to a wide variety of tools, including photographing our students doing all sorts of activities at school. We have noticed

that some photos of our students have appeared on social media – we understand that people taking and sharing photos during school sanctioned activities are doing so with good intentions. What people may not realize is that we have a number of students who have media restrictions in place and parents have indicated they do not want their child's photo to appear publically. In order to respect the privacy of our students, we ask that you do NOT download, copy, or distribute any pictures or other personal information through social media that contain images of students and/or student work other than your child's.



Inclement Weather and Clothing

Although we have had sunny days, we know that soon the rainy weather will be upon us! It is extremely important for students to have appropriate clothing and footwear for outdoor use, along with a pair of inside shoes to change into when inside the building. These shoes are also



used for gym use. We expect students to wear warm coats (hoods are a good idea) and we recommend boots, hats, gloves, and umbrellas. In general, students go outside to play during recess and lunch breaks, even if it is raining or snowing. Each day, we assess the combination of weather, wind, and temperature to determine whether or not it is suitable for the students to play outside. We recommend that students have a spare change of clothing kept at school in case of various emergencies. We have a very limited supply of clothing available

62. We call upon the Council of Ministers of Education, Canada to maintain an annual commitment to Aboriginal education issues, including:

 Developing and implementing Kindergarten to Grade Twelve curriculum and learning resources on Aboriginal peoples in Canadian history, and the history and legacy of residential schools.

We encourage you to include books in your classroom and discuss residential schools in all grades. There are many great reading lists available, here is one with <u>suggestions</u>.




Witness Blanket Book - By Carey Newman and Kirstie Hudson Available at Strong Nations



Artist Carey Newman created the Witness Blanket to make sure that history is never forgotten. The Blanket is a living work of art—a collection of hundreds of objects from those schools. It includes everything from photos, bricks, hockey skates, graduation certificates, dolls and piano keys to braids of hair. Behind every piece is a story. And behind every story is a residential school Survivor, including Carey's father.
