Noticing and Dressing for the Weather

We are in the season of Yuxaytlthut, known as the "time before it gets cold", and our seasonal moon is Xwusulénuxw, moon of falling leaves.

Our local Indigenous teachings inspire us to observe and understand the signs of changing weather. In the spirit of inquiry, we encourage our students to be mindful of their surroundings and appreciate the interconnectedness of the environment. This awareness extends to their daily lives, especially as we transition into cooler weather.

To adapt to the changing conditions, it's crucial for students to be wellprepared. We recommend suitable clothing and footwear for outdoor activities, along with inside shoes that double as gym shoes. As the temperatures drop, warm coats (with hoods), boots, hats, gloves, and umbrellas become essential components of their daily attire.

Despite the weather, our students continue to explore and play outdoors during recess and lunch breaks. Our daily assessment considers various factors, including weather conditions, wind, and temperature, to ensure a safe and enjoyable outdoor experience. This not only aligns with our commitment to adaptability but also provides an opportunity for children to engage actively with their environment.

In the spirit of preparedness, we suggest students keep a spare change of clothing at school for unexpected situations. While we maintain a limited supply of spare clothing, having personal backups ensures that your child remains comfortable and ready for any weather-related surprises.

Inclement Weather

While we are enjoying the cooler weather of this season, we also that with colder temperatures around the corner, we may experience inclement weather.

In the event of inclement weather that may impact student safety, the school district will take necessary precautions. Notifications about school closures, class postponements, or disruptions to bus services will be promptly posted on the district website and shared with local media outlets through School Messenger.

Before making any decisions, the Superintendent collaborates with the Director of Operations, considering current and forecasted weather conditions while communicating with relevant community members. Decisions regarding bus operations or school closures will aim to be made by 6:15 am and communicated to the media by 6:30 am.

Parents/Guardians are advised to stay informed through local media.

Bus Etiquette

As we prioritize the safety and well-being of all students during their bus journeys, we kindly request your assistance in reinforcing our transportation department's behavior expectations with your children. It's crucial to create a shared understanding that any disturbance on the bus can compromise safety.

Unacceptable behaviors include fighting, inappropriate language, spitting, vandalism, littering, throwing objects, improper seating, roughhousing, and unnecessary screaming. In the case of such behaviors, a 'Student Incident Report' may be issued by the driver, covering incidents like being late at the bus stop, leaving the bus stop prematurely, disrespecting the driver, failure to produce a bus pass, refusing to sit in the assigned seat, and distracting the bus driver.

If your child does receive a 'Student Incident Report,' your prompt signature as a parent or guardian is required for their continued bus privileges.

Your collaboration is invaluable in fostering a safe and positive environment for all our students during their bus rides.
