Room 8 was asked 'How tall can our team build a tower?' Problem solving, communication and teamwork in action!





Discovery Students

Leadership discovery students recently visited our City Hall to learn how community leaders support the needs of our community through strong leadership. They were able to participate in a 're-enactment' of a council meeting in order to learn first-hand how decisions are made at a community level. Students served in various roles including being councilors and the Mayor! The following are reflections from a few leadership students following that experience. Our thanks to the staff at City Hall for inviting us to participate in such a meaningful learning opportunity and to the NBES PAC for sponsoring this event!





Brett:

My experience at city hall was fun. I shared the Mayor's spot with Nathan. We asked lots of questions...most of them were answered. I also got to sit in the Mayor's chair for a meeting and got to wear the "chain of office" and was able to make big decisions. I also got to use the cool microphones that the Mayor and councilors use. They were really kind and showed lots of leadership. The experience was tremendous!

Nathan:

My experience at city hall was fun. I learned that the Feds get 50% of the taxes, the province gets 42% and our municipal government only receives 8% of the tax funds. They have to work as a team to make good decisions using this tax money. I realized that everyone has an important job and that the mayor is not the most important, but he really includes every councilor in making his decisions. I like using the microphones! I got to wear the 'chain of office' because I got to be the 'Mayor'.





Grace:

My experience at City hall was awesome! I learned that all the taxes we give to the government is split. The groups of government are Federal, Provincial and Municipal. Federal government gets 50% of taxes. Provincial Government gets 42% of taxes. Municipal government gets 8% of our taxes! Only 8%! Why could it not get split into thirds?

In the re-enactment I was the 'new business' item. The most fantastic thing of all, though, was to use the microphones. Bur the first time I spoke I forgot to turn it on! The chairs were comfy and the desk was polished wood! I wish I could go again! It was fun!

Audrey:

My experience at city hall was fun because I got to learn what it means to be a good leader. I learned that the police and fire chiefs do good things for our community, that the bylaws, safety and mayor's responsibilities are big decisions. I also learned that working as a team, loving what you do is important.

In addition to changes to our curriculum, the BC Ministry of Education is also changing assessment of student learning and how we communicate what we notice about student learning with families. Part of the shift we are being asked to make is to focus more on opportunities for students to take a central role in sharing where they are in their learning as well as sharing what they see as their next steps. As educational researcher Anne Davies says, "When students communicate with others what they have learned, they come to better understand what they have learned and what they need to learn."

In response to these changes, our spring conferences this year will be student led. Each class will be open for families to tour and teachers will have worked with their students as to what and how to share their learning with families. In addition, there will be displays and opportunities to explore the learning happening at Nanoose Bay Elementary throughout the school. Families who have specific questions for teachers that they feel need private conversation, are encouraged to make appointments at a mutually convenient time. We look forward to seeing everyone on March 8th from 2:30-5:00 pm or March 9th from 5:00-7:30 pm. We suggest planning to be at school for 1/2 hour - hour to hear your child describe his/her learning.

Notice to Parents Regarding: Cross-boundary Requests

Parents of students wishing to attend a school outside of their catchment area next year are required to submit an "Application for Cross-boundary Enrollment for Following School Year" form.

"Applications for Cross-boundary Enrollment for Following School Year" **must** be submitted during the months of February and March (First Monday in February up to, and including, the last Friday in March prior to Spring Break). Early applications will not be accepted.

• Cross-boundary requests submitted outside the noted time frame must be by way of "Application for Late Cross-boundary Enrollment" form.

District students making a cross-boundary application must FIRST be registered at their catchment school prior to being able to be considered for cross-boundary enrollment.

Siblings of previously approved continuing cross-boundary students may apply directly to the cross-boundary school during this time frame only. If cross-boundary application is outside of this time frame, siblings of previously approved continuing cross-boundary students must register at their catchment school, based on their home address, and submit an "Application for Late Cross-boundary Enrollment" form.

A student who has spent the previous school year in an approved cross-boundary placement at a District 69 school will be deemed to be a catchment area student for the duration of his/her attendance at the school. This status will be retained upon transition to the secondary school which students from that school would normally attend based on district catchment areas (A second cross-boundary application is not required for this transition).

Wherever possible, requests will be approved. The District does, however, reserve the right to rescind any approved cross-boundary transfers up to and including September 30. The decision to return a student to his/her catchment area school will be based on current legislation regarding class sizes and Board Policy 7015.

Transportation for a student choosing to attend a non-catchment school or District program is the responsibility of the parent.

Access to District Programs, are not subject to the cross-boundary application process. Access to these programs are based on availability of space, resources, and staffing. A cross-boundary application is not required.
